The Bedlam Bar at the Black Bulls 1head, Openwoodgate is closed as of August 25th. Former Little Chester Ale House landlord Walter Scott has submitted plans to open Ashbourne's first micropub, the Queens Vaults on the Market Place. He hopes to be open by Christmas. (Didler) Rumour has it that a new micropub is to open in Pinxton, while the Bulls Head at Belper Lane End may soon be open again as work is being carried out there. A new micro bar may be opening in Pinxton, while work is being carried out at the Bulls Head, Belper Lane End with a view to reopening soon, and Titanic Brewery are set to open a bar on Stoke Railway station. Bald Eagle Holbrook's Hairy Brewery seems to be in limbo as one of the brewers has been in hospital. He's out now and is fine, and a decision on the future will be made soon. Raw Brewery has been reborn under the name of Industry Ales, some of which have appeared at the Burnt Pig in Ilkeston, whose owner Simon is putting together a beer list for Ilkeston fair. Little Eaton Brewery beers have appeared at wvarious outlets. and the Kings Head, Duffield reopened in August with 4 real ales, including Kings Head IPA, a special for the pub .Charisma

The Didler writes; One recent Saturday I caught the Manchester train to Oxford Road station then caught the number 15 bus to Urmston and first ever visit here and made my way to the Lord Nelson (gbg) this is a classic Holts pub with four spotless rooms here sampled great pint of Holts Bitter £2-62p and great service with friendly chatty locals, I then made my way to Flixton Conservative club (qbq) after signing in with steward Nigel who was so welcoming I found a range of 5 ales Brightside maverick ipa 4.8 -Pictish brewers gold 3.8-pictish alechemist 4.5 Wells bombardier and my choice being pint of pictish galena 4.3 £2.80p cracking and a very comfortable clean club very impressed and not to be missed if in the area as it always has a great range of ales, but it was soon time leave and make my way back up Flixton Rd into **Tim Bobbin** w-spoons here half of Beartown-bluebeary 4.0 £1.15p good drop in this smaller type spoons with a relaxed feel to it. A few doors up brought me to Prairie Schooner (gbg)micro pub, where I sampled half of Outstanding-farmer tan 3.9 £1.30p and it was truly outstanding and brilliant price and service, then a short walk to Steam house situated in old railway building on Urmston railway station. This ex brew pub had a range of 5 ales, and I sampled half of Black edge-american 4.2 £1.65p but poor ale here so swiftly moving on I caught bus no 233 back to Manchester and it dropped me outside the classic inventory and (gbg) Britons Protection, a gem where I sampled half of Silver street -head for the hills 3.8 £1.98p in good order and great atmosphere, a short walk took me to the Rising Sun (gbg) for half of Bank top flat cap 4.0 £2-05p in good nick at city prices, then a short walk up to City Arms (gbg) half of Northern powerhouse blonde 4.0 £1-90p very good in this packed old trad boozer with original interior. ,Heading up to piccadilly nipped into Castle Hotel (qbq) Robinsons pub for half of Robinsons dizzy blonde 3.8 £1-70p nice ale, then just enough time for last call in Piccadilly tap micro pub on concourse outside railway stn for half of Siren craft broken dream 6.5 £2-10p.

Shropshire Visits

On Fri Aug 31st I made my way to Ironbridge for the Old Fruit's birthday, a bit of history and a look around some pubs. We were staying on the edge of the town at Ye Olde Robin Hood which was a Holden's house with Golden Glow & Black Country Best Bitter their mainstay ales. The beer here was the best in the area and we were made very welcome so for once a good decision on my part. After a couple of pints and a meal we took a walk on the road alongside the river into the main town to find that the famous bridge was having a major repair and was shrouded in incongruous plastic sheeting. At the far end of the town we tried the Swan which was mainly an eatery with a wide selection of keg beers and the only cask ale being Tetley's No.3. This was not especially good and the house ale by Box Steam had run out. On Sat morning we set off across the newer bridge to the other side of the river in glorious weather, passing through lots of industrial heritage before crossing back on a footbridge to reach Coalport. Here we entered the Brewery Inn which was the only place open before noon and the Ludlow Gold was reasonable as we sat in the pleasant garden overlooking the Severn. We then visited the Shakespeare which is mainly gastro but with a lukewarm welcome. The Old Fruit had a lemon beer from Glamorgan which I did not recognise but it was too cloudy and had been taken off when we passed the bar on the way out. No apology or replacement was forthcoming as I made do with Ludlow Best. After this disappointment we crossed back over the river to the Boat Inn,

where the landlord was not initially very forthcoming but gradually started a conversation as there was nobody else inside. The pub is situated right by the river and floods at least annually; not helped by the bank repairs further upstream that deflect the river straight into the pub. It is a very historic pub with a classic interior with many pictures of previous flooding and other interesting artefacts. . I chose Pedigree over Banks's Bitter and it was actually very good. We then retraced our steps back past the tile museum at Jackfield before arriving at the Black Swan where the beer garden is across the road with many tables on the river bank being very pleasant in the sunshine. A series of wasps were wafted from one table to another but the

Hobson's Town Crier & Old Prickly were fairly good. We walked past our residence and into the town again where the Old Fruit kindly allowed me to enter the Coracle micropub. This had been too busy to get in the night before so with plenty of room during Sat afternoon I was looking forward to a selection of different ales but unfortunately for me it was a busman's holiday with 2 from Dancing Duck, Kelham Island Pale Rider and only Gorgeous Beer Blonde of interest with our local beers following me around. I also tried the White Hart which is also rather gastro but at least had Woods Shropshire Lad, albeit not that great. Later on we went in the Bird In Hand, which was near our base but did not seem to keep to regular hours and I was able to try Six Bells Owdo! & Noggin which were both decent. At the side of this the road was so steep that vehicles were not permitted but we staggered up to the Golden Ball. This was a classic pub. frequented only by locals for obvious geographical reasons but with old fashioned separated room areas. The friendly barman offered Wye Valley HPA, Butcombe Bitter and Hobson's Town Crier. I discovered later that I had missed the Horse & Jockey which was very close by and would have been worth visiting. On the Sunday we visited Blists Hill Victorian Village which includes an old Walsall pub rebuilt within and unimaginatively renamed the New Inn. It was worth going in for the historic Victorian interior and barman but the only ale was Banks's Amber which was fairly moderate. We then visited the GBG All Nations which is nearby but addressed as being at Madeley. With another sunny day it was great to sit in the extensive gardens and sample their own house beer which was the best of the weekend, so much so that I had another. Other ales were Kinver Khyber, Hobson's Old Prickly and Ludlow Gold. The landlady was especially welcoming and the pub was largely untouched inside for many years with a relaxing friendly atmosphere. It was a shame to leave but I had saved the best until last.

On Sat 15th Sept I returned to Shropshire, enabling a visit to Church Stretton. My first call was 12-00 opening time at the Stretton Ale House, a micropub in the main town area with all pubs on the same street and none at all on the shopping street. This had 6 cask ales - Stonehouse Zaffir, Woodforde's Wherry, Hobson's Town Crier, St Austell Proper Job and 2 from Salopian; Oracle & Labyrinth. The latter was a stout which I thought was unusual with Salopian usually having pale ales. It was good, as were the Stonehouse, Woodforde's and Hobson's. Quite large for a micro with up-market furniture and I would imagine very popular evening times. I also visited the King's Arms which is a historic Joules owned pub and found the Blonde & Pale rather disappointing but at least the barman was cheerful. I consequently did not try the Slumbering Monk or Titanic Steerage. Next to the Old Coppers Malthouse, an attractive building outside and standard pub format inside. Ahead of the more predictable Abbeydale Moonshine, St Austell Tribute and Brains Rev James I selected the Enville Ale. This proved to be a really superb drink but time prevented me from having another. Later that evening I visited the Apple Tree at Onibury which is a few miles away near to Craven Arms. We had a good meal here and enjoyed the excellent Ludlow Stairway which was a new ale for me. The bar also featured Ludlow Gold and Wye Valley HPA which I did not get chance to sample in this rustic village pub with a friendly landlord. There are not many GBG pubs in this area but others are sometimes worth a visit as in this case but do not drink in Craven Arms which looks like a cask ale desert. Chris P. Duck

North o' Border

On the morning of September 15th I met up with Honest Haydn at Derby train station where we got the 8.19 Glasgow train, which deposited us in Edinburgh at just after 1.00 and from there we got the train to Dunkeld & Birnham where we were met by Mark from Strathbraan Brewery. The initial plan was to go out to the brewery but it was decided we didn't really have enough time so Mark drove us the mile or so into **Dunkeld** and took us on a tour of the pubs. First off was the **Taybank**, which had Landlord and Strathbraan Due South, the latter wasn't set to come on but

we just had to try it. Next we walked to the Perth Arms where 2 Strathbraan beers were on offer of which we went for Head East, which is probably my favourite. The Royal Dunkeld Hotel had 3 on hand pump and we both went for Strathbraan Look West and finally the Atholl Hotel had Due South on, which was in much better order. Mark then deposited us back at the station, where HH was laden with goodies before he bade us farewell. Top bloke and a top brewer of top beer. thanks Mark (if you get to read this). We got the train to Glasgow and called in the GBG Drum & Monkey, which was rammed with early evening imbibers, 6 ales were on offer of which I went for Black Sheep Chocolate & Orange Stout. We dropped our bags off at Rennie Macintosh and then got the train out to Mount Florida and called in the GBG Clockwork Beer Co. were of the 9 beers on offer (all dispensed by tap) I went for Clockwork Run About Stout, which was ok but neither of us really liked the place. We got the train back and walked down to the GBG NI Laurieston Bar, a superb Grade C listed pub with more Formica than you can shake a stick at! 3 Fyne Ales beers were available and we both went for Everybody Loves Ernest.



Then it was on to the underground at Bridge St and up to Cowcaddens where after getting directions to Sauchiehall St we called in the GBG JDW Henglers Circus just to get HH his fix. The service was typically 'spoons but the selection was good and from the 10 ales on offer I went for Jaw Fathom, which was top draw....or top Jaw! Just around the corner is the GBG State Bar, much more our kind of pub - very ornate and a nice island bar - 7 ales on offer with Loch Lomond Lost in Mosaic being favoured Then it was the train from Charing Cross to High St where (after a brief stop for some chips) we had a short walk to the GBG Babbity Bowster as I wasn't sure as to what time it closed. Kelburn Jaguar was favoured of the 3 ales on hand pump. Another short walk got us to the GBG **Drygate**, home of Drygate Brewing Co. 3 of their ales were on hand pump, Pale Duke, Seven Peaks & Fearless IPA and all were sampled and we both concluded that we've had worse! We retraced our steps and called

in our penultimate pub of the day, the GBG Blackfriars, 5 ales on offer with Alechemy Ten Storey Malt Bomb and excellent beer to finish on. Our final pub was the NI Steps Bar, which is NRA but just had to be done as it is one of two well-preserved Art Deco pubs in Glasgow. The following morning we headed back to Edinburgh but alighted at Linlithgow and headed straight for the GBG Linlithgow Tap as it was the farthest away and the first to open. Three ales were on offer (there were a couple of empty pumps) and I plumped for Orkney Dark Island. which was in good form. We had a chat with the barman who told us that Linlithaow is rumoured to have the most licensed premises per head of population! Or something like that. We still had a bit of time to kill so had a wander up to Linlithgow Palace before moving on to the GBG Four Marys. Here we found an impressive range of 8 ales and very friendly bar staff, so friendly we felt compelled to stop for a couple I had Broughton Old Jock (inadvertently) and Woodfordes Norfolk Nog. Heading back to the station we called in the Star & Garter Hotel to find Deuchars IPA and Inveralment Lia Fail on offer with the latter being in fine form. Finally it was on to the GBG Platform 3 where of the 3 beers on hand pump we both sampled Stewart Pentland IPA and Alechemy Ritual. Then it was back to Edinburgh where we had a quick half in the Jinglin' Geordie (I favoured Loch Leven Kings Slayer of the 3 ales on offer) before returning to the GBG Halfway House, where we did have time to have the Cullen Skink soup, which was delicious. There were 4 beers on and we had a couple of halves though I can't remember what.....I was too busy with my soup. The 3.08 got us back into Derby for just after 8.00 where swift halves were had in the Alex and the Brunswick before I had to go for my bus -Rodders
