Brewery News: Magic Rock from Huddersfield has been sold to Lion, an Australian company and will now invest heavily to keep up with demand. This news has not gone down at all well and many pubs have ceased buying these beers, a great shame with the high reputation it once had.

Some sad news concerning the closed and boarded up Bridge Inn Cotmanhay, which is to be demolished during June to make way for an apartment block. The pub had been run by seven different landlord's during the last seven years and struggled to make a profit because in its heyday this former Hardy & Hansons pub was a hive of activity with dart's dominos & skittles in this two roomed unspoilt trad pub, in a superb setting next to the Erewash canal, and so another classic old boozer bites the dust - a great shame.

Supporting local Beer Festivals
On the opening day of the Marlpool ale house beer festival I decided to pay Andy a visit, finding 15 ales on the outside bar. On the 16th May I was at barrow hill beer festival. It was a fantastic setting inside the engine shed which incorporated a turntable. There were 3 real ale bars, a craft keg bar, and a cider bar inside the engine shed, with brewery bars scattered around the festival. There was a choice of over 200 real ales, a selection of over 60 ciders and over 50 craft keg beers. On Friday 17th May the Pothole spring beer festival was my destination, and there was a selection of 19 beers on the list, but there were one or two not available.

The Kings Head in Duffield, which Frank Lampard has been seen in several times, has been nominated for a Great British Pub award by the Morning Advertiser. They currently have a happy hour promotion from 3-6, Monday to Friday, when all beers are £3 per pint. Angelo's Bistro has moved there from Milford, and work is being done to develop an outside seating area. Pedigree is the permanent beer, with several guests plus craft and cider, Aldwark brewery at Matlock have taken over Stanley's micro bar in Matlock. Titanic brewery have leased the Poets Corner in Ashover from Kim Beresford, when I visited the pub there were 4/5 titanic beers on the bar, also an everards beer and ruddles, 2 ashover beers, oakham citra & a little critters beer. West Midlands Trip

On a lovely sunny Bank holiday I met up with sister Kit and her partner health and safety Dave, followed by Phil (one of beer brothers from Dewdrop Inn) and Al the thross on a service bus to Nottingham. We made our way to the playhouse for 9.30am coach run by Al (Gruff) with around 37 boarding here. We then picked up fellow CAMRA and ruradians Bob & Sue, Trigger, Honest Haydn-Trev Spencer (rurad editor)-Carl Brett (CAMRA Regional Director) and Fletch (Derby CAMRA) outside Derby railway stn with total of 44 cost £15 each. We made good time arriving at **Great Western** Wolverhampton at 11-10, even with Wolves being at home. It was nice and steady, here, I sampled 1pt and a half of Bathams best bitter 4.3 £2-30p a favourite of mine in splendid condition and always at a great pub to do. Around mid day we headed on short journey to the **Beacon Hotel** (Sarah Hughes) in Sedgley and had half of Manchester elephant juice 4.2 unfined £1-65p followed by half Sarah Hughes dark ruby 6-0 £1-50p - excellent in this classic boozier. Moving on and in no time we arrived at the **Jolly Crispin** in Upper Gornal and my choice being half Potbelly-a piggin' ipa 4.0 £1-60p nice drop. The lone barman was rather overwhelmed by our untimely visit but he coped well with it. It was then a short stroll down the road to the classic **Britannia inn** for 1pt and a half of Bathams best bitter £2-95p brilliant, many on the trip purchased most of pubs top notch cobs here Our next stop was the legendary **Vine (Bull & Bladder)**, the home of Bathams ales at Brierley Hill here had 1pt Bathams best bitter £2-95p good stuff and got a nice cosy seat in front bar, with everybody enjoying this trip. . After my consultation with the Gruff we decided to make unscheduled stop at Fixed wheel brewery beer festival at Blackheath, a lot of beers had been sold so I settled for half of fixed wheel - trough & off 3.8 £1-50p and decent enough, only a swift stop here, before our final stop outside **Waggon & Horses Halesowen** for around one and three quarter hours. . Me, Kit and Dave decided

to walk to the **Hawne tavern** a former GBG pub around 8 ales on but trip started to take its toll so settled for half Bathams best bitter £1-55p and very good. We then headed back to meet the rest in Waggon & Horses and half of Windmill hill-chesterton ipa 4.2 £1-65p great finisher. We left at 7-25pm back to Derby then Nottingham. An excellent trip, everybody was so well behaved and all back on bus on time at every stop, many thanks to you all, and a huge thank you to Al (Gruff) for organising this trip, let's hope for many more to come .**The Didler**.

BRUSSELS BY EUROSTAR

Possibly the easiest way to get to Brussels ! we left Langley Mill on the 7.35 morning train to Nottingham, and on arrival at Nottingham our carriage awaited on platform 7 direct to St Pancras only stopping 4 times (1 hour, 40 Mins!). At St Pancras THE EUROSTAR STATION IS A DODDLE, just walk downstairs, through security, time for a coffee as our fast train leaves at 10.58 on the dot and onward to Brussels. The Eurostar is a fantastic stress free way to travel. We arrived in Brussels at 14.05 and you can take either number 3 or 4 tram into the city, our only 3 stops to our hotel the ibis central close to the area St Gerry - first area of research, so cases in and off we go! Yippee.

Fist bar **MAPPA MUNDO**, LOADS of bottles and choice of 20 draught beers to nice outside seating area to people watch, next stop the infamous **ROYAL THEATRE TOONE** very quirky great bar with kwak on draught at good price then short walk to **A LA MORT SUBITE** - THIS PLACE HAS NOT BEEN TOUCHED since the thirties, beers pricey but well worth the experience (FOOD looked good). Next **CLAIRES BAR** with six draught beers and loads of bottles, this is just a small bar mainly English speaking locals that loved chatting to us and probably the cheapest bar in the city with a pint of Juliper 3 1/2 euro. We found next **CHEZ MARCELLE**, bottled beers and bar man very friendly and free nibbles. Things are a little hazy now, we'd been recommended the lava bar on the way back to the hotel, a great place and another locals bar with fantastic bottle range plus 6 on draught, and to finish the night into the **BIXON BAR**

Next stop **MOEDER LAMBIC** for two more of their own brewed keg beers then **POECHENELLEKELDER**, WHERE ON seeing the food had lunch served with a waterloo dubble another wonderful beer, next **A LA BECASSE A FAMOUS BEER HALL** mega range of bottles just 3 draughts. Night time arrived looking forward to this the **DELIRIUM VILLAGE** - this must be the busiest bar in Brussels set over 3 floors and so busy due to the wonderful beers. Sampled all 3 delirium ales they had on, every floor has different beers, then on just a quick stop at **GOLDEN BAR** whilst google caught up basic tourist trap eventually found **BON VIEX TEMPS** - this one had took some finding as it's down an alley with just a small sign, however

The Wingfield Wanderer was long overdue for a wander round Wingfield, South that is. Following the recent re-opening of the **Bluebell** after extensive renovation, the 3 remaining establishments were ripe for a visit. First up was the Bluebell. Impressive inside though the purple décor not to my liking. Of the five hand pumps, 2 are ever changing and Landlord, Pedigree and Bishops Farewell are the 3 regulars at £3.80 a pint. But beware: a half will set you back £2.00. Worse still, over on the kegs, Aspall's Cider is £4.50 a pint yet a massive £2.50 a half (Aspall's £1.80 a half in the Yew Tree). The other lagers are similarly priced. No real Ciders or Perry's. Good quality Ale but at a price. Quite noisy when busy because of no carpets. Further up the village can be found **Ye Olde Yew Tree Inn**. Two regulars of Bass & Pedigree and 2 changing beers - on my visit was an excellent Grasshopper Cricket and Golden Hen. Also on offer were hand pumped Mango Cider and Bee Sting. £3.30 a pint. Last and by no means least, the **Social Club**. 2 regular changing beers on hand pump. Superb Abbot Ale and an offering from Lenton Brewery - who do feature regularly. Very well kept and very well priced at £3.00 a pint and, unlike the Bluebell, only £1.50 a half. Now that's more like it. Despite some people having (to me, unfounded) a bit of a stigma when it comes to 'Working Men's Clubs', this one is the social hub of the village with many a varied events and functions. Perfect summer venue with masses of outside seating and parking - well away from the polluting traffic. In order of preference: The Social Club, Yew Tree then the Bluebell. **The Wingfield Wanderer**.

Branching out in East Anglia

On the morning of May 6th I got the bus to Nottingham train station where I met up with HH and Charisma (who'd got the train from Alfreton) at the barrier and we had a mad dash to get the 8.35 Norwich train (thankfully the train manager saw us running down the platform as we got on the train with seconds to spare). After a seemingly interminable journey we arrived in **Norwich** at 11.15-ish, off-loaded our bags at the digs and headed straight for the **GBG Coach & Horses**, which was just around the corner.

This is the tap house for Chalk Hill brewery and they had 9 of their beers on of which I went for Black Anna, very nice. Charisma wanted to go to the **GBG Fat Cat** so we got the bus out (another seemingly interminable journey due to the traffic) and found the usual staggering array of 20+ beers on hand pump and gravity. I had their Norwich Bitter because it was near the top of the list. We got the bus back in to the centre, which didn't seem to take quite as long, and bailed out near the **GBG Murderers** where there were 9 beer on hand pump and the St Peters Plum Porter was a superb drop. Then it was a short walk to the (other) **GBG Coach & Horses**, a GK pub that had 7 pumps on the go (thankfully only 2 where GK beers) Boudicca Spiral Stout was my choice. Another short walk, which would have been shorter if I'd not walked passed it thinking it was a Thai restaurant, got us to the **GBG Vine**, which is Norwich's smallest pub.....but not a micro pub! 4 wickets on and the Fat Cat Tom Cat was in fine form. The **GBG St Andrews Brewhouse** (which had a Star Wars theme going off being May the 4th and all that) was next on the list and 5 of their

were on offer, I went for the Tombland Porter, which was in top form. It really did deserve a prolonged stay but we had to get back to the station for our train (HH wanted to ride the class 37's top 'n' tail "Concrete Bob" & "Spirit of the Lakes") to **Lowestoft** where we had a bit of a walk to get to the **GBG Stanford Arms**, a cracking little back street boozer with 10 hand pumps on the go, I opted for Winters *Genius*. A 10-minute walk got us to the **GBG Triangle Tavern**, the tap house for Green Jack brewery (which we passed en-route) and Albion Mild was favoured of the 11 beers on offer (Charisma & I asked for halves but ended up with pints, though we didn't have to pay for pints). Then it was a bus ride to **Gorleston** (not Gallstone as HH kept calling it) where we had a look in the **GBG Oddfellows Arms** but moved straight on to the **GBG New Entertainer**, which had a wide range of predominantly pedestrian beers, Severn Meadow Honey was one of the few interesting ones. Then it was a brief visit to the **GBG Dock Tavern**, where of the 5 ales on offer I went for Rudgate Third Wheel, before we continued on the bus to **Great Yarmouth** where our first port of call was the **GBG Mariner**, which had 8 wickets on the go and Nene Valley

Australian Pale was favoured. Just around the corner we found (after walking past it) the **GBG Tombstone Saloon** where there were 7 beers on gravity, I had tombstone Texas Jack and Billaricay Woody's bark. Time was catching up with us so we decided to head back to Norwich (conveniently passing a chippy on the way back to the station) where on arrival we got a taxi out to the **GBG Whalebone**, which was the pub Snug Dave, Jed and I walked out a few years ago when Snug Dave was asked to remove his baseball cap and refused. On this occasion Charisma was more compliant and HH's flat cap wasn't an issue. The beer selection wasn't especially overwhelming so we went for Moongazer Wild One, which was decent. Then it was just around the corner to the **GBG Rosebery Tavern** where there were 4 beers on offer with 3 from Wolf Craft, we all sampled one each. Mine, Wild Card was OK but I think Charisma's ended up down the toilet! We then headed back toward the centre calling in the **GBG Leopard** to find a good selection 6 ales of which Shortts Strummer was partaken. It was at this point I parted company with HH & Charisma (after directing them to the Kings Arms) and made my way to the **GBG Wig & Pen** where I went for Moongazer White Face of the 6 available before moving on to the **GBG Ribs of Beef** where Wiper & True Milk Shake Stout was favoured of the 9 on hand pump. Heading back to the digs I decided on a whim to call in the **Compleat Angler** having been in way back in 1990 on a Broads holiday. I was quite surprised to find a good selection of 5 of which I opted for Moongazer Nibbler. My final port of call was the **GBG Jubilee**, which was a bit disappointing with 7 uninteresting beers but a swift half of Beartown Bitter was quaffed. The following morning after a hearty breakfast Charisma decided to head straight home whilst HH and I got the train to **Cromer** where we called in the **GBG Red Lion Hotel**, which had 10 beers on offer.
