Beer and Pub News

Charisma and Bald Eagle called at Marlpool Ale House Beer Fest. Well attended with 16 interesting beers on offer including - Pictish Bullion, Deeply Vale Citra Storm, Blythe Gold Rush Good Stuff Ubiquity, Severn Golden IPA, Froth Blowers Riverside Stout and couple of collabs with Marlpool and Imperial- Chamois IPA and 5 Dollar Shake. Also not for the faint of heart Rammy Craft Imperial Mancunian Stout @ 11%. **Seven Stars** at Riddings is now a free house with up to 4 ales on. When we called 2 Beermats beers on Ultimate and Pragmatic. Old Sawley beers on next.

The Coach and Horses at Horsley will soon be under new management as Paul Carroll, long-time steard at the Strutt Club in Belper takes up the reins.

The Durham Ox, Street Lane, is closed and appears to be being used as an office by a firm of accountants.

The Mill House in Milford is also closed. As to its future, that has yet to be decided.

The Redemption Alehouse in Heanor is holding its 2nd Birthday Bumper Beer Festival Bash Thursday 28th June - Sunday 1st July, with 20+ Real Ales and live music from Red and Jaque Seviour

The lease of the Traveller's Rest at Kilburn is up for sale by Star Pubs and Bars.

Here's a couple of Beer Festivals to look forward to - the Tapin Derby has its 10th Anniversary Beer Festival from the 7th-10th June, featuring beers never yet seen in Derby, including some from the Manning Brewery. At the same time, albeit starting a day later and again running to the 10th is the Black Bulls Head, Openwoodgate Beer Festival, where there will be 30 beers to be enjoyed.

Here's some news from the Grasshopper Brewery, based in Langley Mill: their core beers are Nymph copper red rye 4.2%, Cricket US pale 4.5% Devils Horse Irish Stout 4.3%. The Stout won the Silver Award in its category at Barrow Hill. Beers are going to be featured at Beauvale, Newark Belper and Langley Marina beer fests. 2 new beers to look out for are Knee High, a session EPA and Kung Fu a 5% beer.

After a successful launch last month, a regular monthly "Meet The Brewer" evening is now taking place at **Red Lion in Ripley** on the first Monday of every month.

This months featured brewery is **Little Critters from Sheffield**, and there will be SIX different ales available on the bar, with Mark and Richard in attendance from 7:30pm onwards on Monday 4th June. See you there!

View from the Chair

If Wordsworth was enthralled by "A host of golden daffodils" then it's the sun on them that West Yorkshire Hills that does it for mesuch was the case yesterday when stepping from the train in Halifax, following Dave Sheldon's posting of the list for the Three Pigeons fest. The general feeling of well-being enhanced by a sniff of freshly mown grass at the top of Station drive...nowt better! Thanks to Dave for inspiring me to go. We made the Three Pigeons our first port of call a few mins after noon, and as I was checking what was still on and Toni was sorting seating, Dave and Carol appeared having already made their first selection. A few mins later we were joined by Barry McWigan.

Having been busy this week with estate duties, I had not been very thorough in my preparation for our Halifax visit, so thanks again to Dave for making sure I was up to speed on those places requiring a visit during out time here, some were new to me

So during our two hour stay much waffling ensued between us, Dave imparting much info along the way....we were teasing him about how he splits his time research versus home chores... Carol was quite clear he does chip in.....

There were 17 Beers from new or very recent Breweries on offer split between the main bar and a Temporary Bar in one of the backrooms, and available in 1/3rds in any number, flights of three or individually. Two notable brews were an Oak

Aged Porter called Black Goddess 4.8 from Meanwood Brewery, also Bandit from Nomadic a good Pale Ale. All beer sampled was in good order and enjoyed, some were expected to go and be replaced during the afternoon. The pub brought out some free sandwiches and samples of their Pigeon/Pork pies, which was a nice touch. Around two we all went off on our separate agenda's Toni and myself making for the Alexandra Bottle shop/Bar on Alexandra St, which hosted two cask and four Keg Taps.

We opted for Ridgeside Cascade Pale on cask and Northern Monk: Green Eyed Monster 5.5 on Keg, the latter being very tasty as it should at £3.40 a half...ouch! Next door and owned by the same people is the Lantern, four more wickets here and Bad Seed: Choco-o- Peel mild 3.9 was a chocolate/orange mild, unfinned and tasty, this was sampled alongside a Wishbone Triple Hop Pale which also proved to be good. At this stage Toni opted for a bit of window shopping, whilst I went to locate the Victorian Craft Beer Café. I have been before but had some difficulty finding it. What Pub says Rawson St, which is misleading because it is in Powell St, which runs off Rawson St. There was a great selection on both Cask & Keg, my choice being Sqwark: Milvus IPA 6.3. This turned out to be an unfinned big Juicy IPA, and very much enjoyed.

I lounged on a settee at the back of the drinking area, whilst much mayhem ensued around the bar. For the second time in two consecutive pubs I struck up a conversation with someone seated nearby, on this occasion a couple who had recently moved to Halifax from Hebden Bridge, due to easier travelling from the latter. My next move took me up towards Broad St and the Pump Room micro pub, which is a small, quirky establishment sporting 5 wickets and another array of Keg. Dave and Carol were again encountered here and we had a brief chat prior to their departure. My choice of beer was Bingley: Mohem (Magnum & Saaz) me being particularly fond of the latter.

.My penultimate call In Halifax due to train constraints was the Graystone Unity, another quirky little micro bar opposite the entrance to Halifax Town Hall and in intimate proximity to it. Again a good mix of Cask & Keg was available, one of the beers on was from Goose Eye and the landlords family had been involved in the original Gooseeye Brewery when situate nr Howarth in Bronte Country in the eighties. was re-joined by Toni at this point and we sampled the Goose Eye: Chinook Blonde 4.0 and The Geeves (Barnsley): Rococo 3.6 a superb Chocolate mild and a firm favourite of Toni's now!

Back towards the station now and heading for the Piece Hall (former cloth exchange) restored in 2017 and featured on National TV. It is a stunning place and unique in its size/style and only two mins walk from the station. In a corner of the complex is the Square Chappel Cafe Bar, sporting 4 wickets, one of which was occupied by a brew from Helmsley Brewery not often seen in this area of West Yorkshire, so we sampled that alongside Black Band Porter 5.5, from Kirkstall, another creation by Dave Sanders during his time with the Brewery. There was some chat here that he may have returned from his stint at Tapped in Sheffield to Copper Dragon or whatever they are called this week. Both beers were enjoyed before catching our train back to Leeds. We were in early and with 25 mins to spare took advantage of the back entrance at the station for a quick visit to the Hop, the choice here being Wilde Child/Revolutions collaboration: Days of Wilde 4.9 which turned out to be a rather nice Banoffee Stout. We then went ack up to the station and onwards to Burton, by which time there was a requirement for a swift half in the Weighbridge. Tudor Black Rock Porter seemed a good idea and proved to be a good choice. Unusually Walter was behind the bar, recently returned from his travels to Scotland looking for somewhere for George and himself to set up their proposed Brewery and Bar, but without success.

Potteries tour

On May 12th I caught the 9:42 train from Derby to Stoke, and then a bus to Fenton, eventually arriving at the Ran ales Brewery and micro pub. I hoped to meet up with members of the Potteries branch of CAMRA, but only one, Rob, turned up, and although about 10 others arrived later, none were from the local Branch. After sampling Ran Jester, 4%, I tried thirds of Hedgehopper, Peachy Blinder and Copperflya, all quality ales. Having caught a bus to Newcastle - under - Lyme we called at the Limestone Vaults, where I enjoyed the Flying Monk Birdman. The next pub was Wealers, owned by Weal Ales for a half of Weal Squweal, This was a compact micropub with a friendly, chatty landlord. On to the Bridge Street Ale House micro, and an excellent Slater's Premium enjoyed in a pleasant pub with a good atmosphere.

Opposite the Bridge is the Hopwater cellar micropub and bottle shop. There are usually 3 ales available here, but on my visit there was just Bristol Beer Factory Dorado, very nice beer served by a friendly landlord. We then caught a bus to Stoke, calling at the Olde Bull and Bush for an excellent Facers Bottle Kiln, a mere £1.25 per half. The next pub wasn't so good, as the St Andrews Grail Ale was sour and undrinkable at the London Road Ale House micropub, and even worse the barman refused to change it - not a pub I'll be visiting again! After visiting the Wheatsheaf, a Wetherspoons pub, for a half of Acorn Heart of Oak I said goodbye to Rob, who had been excellent company all day, and having called at the Glebe for some Joules Pale I caught my train back to Derby, finishing off my day out with a meal and a half of Black Jack New Deck in the Exeter Arms, after which I made my way home.

Town Centre Series - Ripley

This is the first in a series of features about the main drinking areas in the In the Sticks circulation area. I've chosen Ripley this time,

partly because I live here, but mainly because there is a lot of choice. If we define the Town centre as beginning at the Pear Tree and ending at the Old Cock there are around 40 beers available in Ripley Town Centre, with Abbott being available at several outlets, and if we include the Talbot, Nags Head and George, which are perhaps just off-centre, that number increases to 51 - so lots to choose from.

As for the actual centre, the Red Lion with 9 and the Thorn Tree with 6 lead the way in terms of choice, whilst the Old Cock with 5, the Pear Tree and Ripley's Little Ale House, both with 4 on regularly aren't too far behind. The Crompton Arms, White Lion, Three Horse Shoes, Keys and the Angel also serve Real Ale, and all this in an area that could be traversed on foot, without calling at any of the pubs of course, in less than 15 minutes!

Several pubs also have a range of Cider and Perry, some serve meals or snacks, a couple have multiple TVs if you wish to relax over a pint while maybe watching the forthcoming World Cup Finals, and all of them are either on or very close to a bus route. The Nines, Sixes, 90, Comet, R One and 1A from Trent Barton, along with the 147 and 148 Your bus services all pass through Ripley. As for opening times, and the best place to look for them is in whatpub, which has all the information anyone visiting Ripley needs. Ed

from Arbor were all enjoyed on the first day, with Timothy Taylors Cook Lane IPA, USA IPA CV!12 and Moonraker the next.

Del & Rodders have been out and about again, among their rambles was a visit to Kirkby in Ashfield, where after a few disappointments they enjoyed a pint of cider at the Wyvern Club, They continued on to the Doghouse where they again went for the cider - Del choosing a rhubarb one while Rodders went for Rosie's Pig. Apart from cider, Blue Monkey Infinity IPA, Titanic Plum Porter and Thornbridge Jaipur were on handpump. Rodders and HH also visited the Beer Festival at the Royal Oak, Ockbrook, and enjoyed some fine ales from Breweries near and far. The 18 beers on offer included ales from Falstaff, Abstract Jungle, Island and Glastonbury. The favourites were Whim Red House Porter and Island Nipper. They also called at Ockbrook's other pubs, the Queens Head, Cross Keys and White Swan, finding real ale available at all 3.

Chris P. Duck has also been on his travels, but not too far! He went to the re-opened Rising Sun at Middleton, which boasts 6 real ales, all regional or national. Moving on to the Hope & Anchor, beers on the bar were Sharps Doom Bar and Atlantic, a house beer from Corrs and Goal Ales Black Maria.

Next, on a walking trip to the Derbyshire Eastern Moors the Royal Oak at Millthorpe, a community-owned pub, had Neepsend Blonde - recommended by the writer - Gales Seafarer, Adnams ghost Ship and Taylors Landlord on offer. This pub is an excellent spot on a sunny day, with a pleasant lawn area giving great views of the nearby hills.

Finally, a weekend in Thorpe while attending a wedding resulted in calls at the Izaak Walton at Dovedale, a large hotel with real ale available. Doom bar, Winkle Sir Philip, which was very good, and Winkle Waller were all on the bar. The Old Dog in Thorpe was a later port of call, with Church End Goats Milk, Titanic Plum Porter, Whim Hartington Bitter and Abbeydale Moonshine all on and all sampled.
