Allestree's 2nd micropub the 189 on Blenheim Drive close to the shopping precinct opened its doors on Friday 19th October, this modern looking well laid out micro hopes to cater for all types of drinkers who call in. There are five wickets on the bar which will be serving a selection of rotating guest beers, on the opening evening the ales available were, Green Jack Golden Best 3.8%, Purple Moose Dark Side of the Moose 4.6 & Snowdonia Ale 3.6%, Dancing Duck Nice Weather 4 Ducks 4.1% and Blue Monkey Infinity 4.6%. Prices are reasonable at £1.65 a half and £330 a pint, not so much the key keg Beavertown Neck Oil 4.3% at £5.00 a pint. Vadett Blonde 5.2% £4.40 And Paolozzi Hellesdon Lager 5.2% £4.80 are also available along with a number of craft canned and bottled beers, bottled cider, wine, fizz and snacks. Supporting local Beer Festivals

Having had a rough day at work, I headed for the Friday session at the Amber Valley CAMRA Beer Festival, and mainly concentrated on the stronger stuff, while the better half worked her way through the darker beers. I had 7 thirds, finishing off with the 7% Yakima Valley from Arbor, washing all my work troubles away and enjoying a very sound night s sleep later on!

On the 10^{th} of October I had an excellent night at the Wetherspoons Beer Festival at the Standing Order which, to my delight, had all the beers together on a separate stillage, I enjoyed several beers here, finishing off with Big Job from St Austell - an extremely satisfying evening. I made a brief visit to the opening night of the Poets Corner Beer Festival at Ashover, where the beer list consisted of 40 ales, including 14 from

Ashover Brewery. Unfortunately some of the beers I wanted to try weren't available, so I settled for Ashover 200, Rooster Parts & Labour and Little Critters White Wolf

Got a lift to Wirksworth for their Beer Festival held at the Maltings, formerly known as Parish Rooms and located near the church. It is just a one day festival and had 20 ales available from 9 mainly local breweries. The ales I had were of excellent quality and came from Aldwark. Ashover, Landlocked, Gaol Ales, Hilltop & Hemlock. It was noted that 9 of the ales were unfined. This was also the last date for drinking Gaol Ales as they are no longer operating. As for the local pubs, there were probably only two or three worth visiting.

Arriving just after mid day to find a busy and friendly beer festival in the town hall with around 60 ales, beers sampled Vocation-new england small beer 2.5-Eagles crag-eagles feather 3.8 - Bingleytight head 3.6 - Anthology-pale 3.6 - Downlandseasy ne ipa 4.3-Pictish--ruach 4.3 -Idle valleypython ipa 6.0 all beers well-kept and enjoyed. Before leaving I had a chin wag with the famous Brian (ticker) Moore from Sheffied. I then made the short walk to Callans a small Imicro pub In a courtyard off the shopping area, and had half Doghouse-bitter 4.2 £1.60p, then made my way to Fox & Goose, a community-owned pub with 3 small rooms with flagstone floors and serving 5 good ales, my choice being half Crooked-the lash (because I was on)4.4 - superb and best today. Making my way back towards centre I called into Drink, a small micro pub and bottle shop with basic decor and 2 handpumps with a very friendly owner who certainly knows his stuff. I had half Top rope-american pale ale 3.9 excellent, then just across the road to Old gate, a busy bar and restaurant with 10 handpumps, where I had half Brewsmith-magic number 3.0 and top ale here.

Just down from here Crown fisheries chippy just opening at 4pm so brilliant fish & chips to eat walking down to my final stop - Vocation & co the brewery's first micro type pub - busy and basic but with 15 keg ales and 4 cask ones. I had half of Northern monk-iternal 4.1 served from a tap to the back wall of the pub. Good beer but all vocation ales were on keg which for me was a great pity. A short walk from here to the Railway Station and the train home, where another little incident occurred, which certainly sobered me up occurred when I went to press the toilet door to open, and a very surprised and embarrassed young lady who had not locked the door and was caught out showing all her glory not only to me but a carriageful of passengers, this certainly quite a sight! Time passed and just under 30 mins later, and at long last, it started to move. The announcements on the station were sort of keeping us up to date, the last one telling us it would be put inside at Grantham, as it was not in good health....to the contrary it approached at speed and was soon just a trail of smoke in the distance.

The fest had opened at 11-00, and with time now approaching 12-00 I made my way across town to the Church. Camra have cooperated with the church authorities to run their Festival here, for the last couple of years. I had not seen a list and although on arrival I found this list to be not wildly exciting, there were a few brews of interest, from the likes of Boss, Windsor & Eton, Ferry Ales, Beer Mats, Charnwood etc

A very pleasant couple of hours were spent here on an initially empty table, but later joined by 3 more senior chaps from a local village who liked their ale traditional...both in dispense and style. Whilst the fest was quiet on arrival, by the time I left at 14-00 it was starting to get busy, and just before leaving I came across fellow Ruradian...Crispy Duck, who also pens the odd tome for the Rurad rag...In the sticks, we waffled briefly.

A mini spin was now on the agenda, starting at the Nobody Inn just round the corner. This pub tends to be an outlet for local Brewery Newby Wyke, and I was intrigued by the name of a recent brew...Lusty...as their beers are normally named after naval vessels. Closer inspection revealed it was a pet name of HMS Illustrious, fortunately the brewers head had not been turned by more carnal thoughts! A short distance away is BearHeadz, always a must visit when in town, a good selection was available across their five wickets, my choice being a brew by Kirkstall I have not seen before, Break Even at 4.6...it turned out to be a very tasty unfined Pale which was thoroughly enjoyed.

Next I had a bit of a leggit out to the **Lord Harrowby**, which is on the opposite side of town to St Wulfrum's Church and where John had an offer of five brews available. I sampled the Fernandes: Yorkshire Tyke 3.6 which I found a tad disappointing, but my other choice Dorking: Washington Gold was much better and again enjoyed. It appears John had got his feet up...no doubt enjoying a well-deserved rest....lol.

The overall plan was for a return to Nottingham on the 15-57 ex Grantham arrival at 16-35...so just time for one final call, this being at the Tollemarche Arms (Spoons) who usually have a good selection available. My choice from the half dozen guests was Inveralmond: Fortingale Chocotale & Caramel Autumn Ale 4.0 which was a very pleasant easy drinking beer, and a return to the station achieved, with the train approaching as I arrived on the platform.

We set off in grand style our first stop being at Bingham some 15 mins later. Unfortunately a few yards beyond the platform we stopped again ...out of course stops are never a good sign.

We were advised of a technical problem and later, that we may be here for some time...consequently the train reversed back to Bingham station so that folks could stretch their legs. Later we learned a fresh driver was being sent from Nottingham. And after we had been there well in excess of an hour, and with the driver having arrived another service on the adjacent platform had lingered and now required a replacement guard, the one from our train fulfilling that role. So we were then advised we would have to catch the following service and our train disappeared into the distance...... empty. Sadly this loss of time meant my plans for Nottingham were abandoned and after a quick connection there for the Birmingham train I was Burton bound and Toni's Taxi for the onward journey to home...the 13th strikes again!

Rurad Trip to St Helens 22 Sept

I met up in Derby with other Ruradians to join a bus arriving from the Nottingham area with yet more people. So about 2 dozen of us set off for St Helens which only took about 2 hours despite motorway speed limits and a services stop. Our bus stopped outside Connoisseur Brewery where Kev the brewer was waiting for us and served 3 of his ales at their GBG Tasting Room which were Lucem, Lantern House & Ruby Ruby Ruby, all at £2-60 a pint. He also took 2 groups around the brewery giving an informative and amusing dialogue. Thanks to HH for organising this visit. Various loose groups then set off on foot to the west side of the town where most of the best pubs appear to be located. HH & I got hopelessly lost almost immediately and wasted about half an hour in a shopping complex before arriving at the George, which had been recommended by a brewery visitor. Although there were 6 handpull sticks, only one was in use so we had no alternative except Wigan Brewhouse California, With 20p Camra discount this was only £2-20 a pint, quality was ok and we found out that the brewery used to be Allgates and also run this pub.

After a few more wrong turns and I forgot to visit the GBG Phoenix, we eventually arrived at the GBG Cricketers Arms with most of the Rurad team in attendance as it was due to receive a Camra award. We had no idea what it was because the pub was so loud we could not hear any of the speeches. No problem with the beer range or quality as you would expect; my Big Hand Bastion was particularly good. A few also tried the Rat Hot Chilli Peppers which was not too hot. The other 11 ales came from Rat (2), Castle Rock (Mint Choc Chip), Lancaster, Ossett, Wigan Brewhouse, Roosters, Small World, Mallinsons, Fernandes and Listers. After a bit more meandering we came across the GBG News Room with a choice of Rock The Boat Liverpool Light, Salopian Hop Twister and Lemon Dream. The ale was ok but I thought the place lacked character. Almost next door is the GBG Talbot Ale House, with a local derby rugby league match on the TVs and the attendant devotees. I had the George Wright Cheeky Pheasant here which was a good drink, the alternatives were both house ales from Merrie City and Westgate.

The other 5 ales were fairly predictable national drinks. A top pub, nominated by some as best of the day. Back on the bus to get into Cheshire and to the Brewery Tap at Lymm. . This is the home of Lymm Brewery and featured their Bitter. IPA, Bridgewater Blonde & Dam Strong Ale (7.4%). . Unfortunately time had run out for the bus driver making this our final stop so many thanks to Charisma and Didler for organising the trip. ChrisPDuck
