Supporting local beer festivals

On the opening day of the **Peacock** beer festival I called in to find a fine selection of some 24 ales mainly from down south, there were 12 on the outside bar and 12 on the main bar. Breweries included Sam Brooks, Two Bens, Tiny Rebel, Three Blind Mice, Parkway, Dovecote, Old Pie Factory, and locally the Elephant. I sampled beers from Sam Brookes, Firebird, Three Blind Mice, but wasn't that impressed with the two Bens APA, nice little festival, I always make the effort to get to this one.

September 13th saw me at the **Thorn Tree at Waingroves**, where there was a choice of some 18 beers. I stationed myself at the garage bar where I sampled reservoir rat from rat brewery at 4.0%, followed by eastern promises from wild childe at 4.3% next was crex ipa from squawk at 4.5% before finishing off on oakham green devil. In the main bar there was a choice of 6 / 7 ales, was well worth the visit. **Charisma**

I called in at the **Gate Inn** at Swanwick recently, and found 3 real ales on the bar, with plans for a 4th one soon. It's run by former Three Horse Shoes, Ripley landlady Michelle, and she's doing an excellent job. She has already had one Beer Festival, and has plans for another next year. I spoke to one of the regulars, and he says it's the best it's been for over 15 years.

Whilst I haven't been there, the news from the **Railway Inn** at Shottle seems promising. It's long been a food-oriented pub and, having visited several times on CAMRA Beer Survey Trips, it's had little to attract the discerning drinker. However, that seems to have changed as the current licensee is keen to increase the availability and variety of Real Ale.

It's gone...and it ain't coming back

Perhaps the first building people visiting Ripley from Derby see as they get to the town centre is the Pear Tree pub. Built almost 200 years ago, and one of the original Hardy's pubs prior to the merger with Hanson's, the Pear Tree was a Coaching Inn, one of many in the area, before motorised transport replaced the horse.

Having been part of the Greene King estate when they bought out Hardy and Hanson's, the Pear was sold to a private owner a few years ago, and became a Free House, albeit still serving many Greene King beers. From the first, the new owner started making changes to the pub, converting the upstairs rooms - the Pear Tree is a three storey building - into flats, sensible enough if the licensee doesn't wish to live on the premises. However, further changes were obviously afoot when planning permission was applied for to build extensions on both sides of the pub, as well as the back. Whilst the Pear Tree has been altered before - the front bar used to be two rooms on either side of a passage - the snug had been unchanged

apart from redecoration for many years, at least 70 and maybe more.

Now though, as planning permission was granted, the old stables, latterly used as a garage, have been demolished, and the pub itself has been gutted. The snug, where myself and others have spent many a happy hour, has gone, and with it the charm and character of the pub. It's just a shell, waiting to be "modernised" and become a larger pub as it's connected to the extensions that have been built around it.

What it will look like when it reopens in November I can only imagine, but I have no doubt that it will bear little resemblance to the local pub that I have known and loved for so long. I'll never know, because I have no intention of ever setting foot in there again, and I know other former regulars who say the same thing. I don't care how comfortable it might be, or how good the ale is, I'll never taste it. I don't know what it's going to be called, all the Pear Tree signs have been removed, but I hope the name is changed, because whatever emerges from the building site that was the Pear tree, it won't be the Pear Tree anymore in my opinion. **Exadman**

Peterborough Beer Festival trip

Arrived at the festival for the trade session on Tuesday afternoon to find a steady crowd. I started with Beccles brew-hodgkins hop 3.7 and a good start with the following ales - Black pit-daytriper 3.8-Romanway-senate gold 4.0-Wooha-blonde 4.0-Blimmey-the paleface 4.5-Beerblefish-brett midler 4.5-Georges/Hopmonster-walasea wench 3.6 -Powderkeg-brain wave 4.6-Neepsend-mosiack5.5, with all ales in great condition at one of the best beer festivals in the country, but I didn't think it was as busy this year. I met up with many friends and tickers including beer brothers from the Dewdrop Inn also Lynne, landlady at above pub, with her bar staff Sharon and June and their husbands plus CAMRA members from Derby & Nottingham, at the train station where I bumped into Carrie, the landlady from Tap & Growler micro pub at Hilltop on her first ever visit here. Back in Nottingham I called into the Barrel Drop micro pub for half of Magpie-6 for gold 4.4 £1.65p with CAMRA discount in.

remarkably good nick and a most enjoyable day - highly recommended. **The Didler**

Tamworth and Lichfield trip

On Thursday September 5th I set out for Derby train station to catch a lunchtime train to Tamworth to attend the 26th Beer Festival there. I saw fellow-Ruradian the Didler, also on his way to Tamworth, at the station, he was going for the day while I'd decided to have a couple of nights down there so I'd have time for further exploration.

Having arrived in the town and checked in at the **Globe Inn**, which is where I was staying, I made my way to the Masonic Rooms on Lichfield Street, which has replaced the Assembly Rooms, at least for the time being, as the Beer Festival venue, the Assembly Rooms requires work. It's quite a good venue to be honest all the beer is in one area and there is seating in the yard as well as a marquee in case of bad weather.

I met up with Didler again here, and also met the Chair, a contributor to this newsletter, and got stuck in to the beers, of which there were many.

My first choice was Plateau, a 3.5% golden ale from Burning Sky brewery, and a tasty start.

Next up was Gentlewood Cog and Stone, a 4% pale ale with a crisp finish, highly recommended. First Chop provided the next beer with Sup, 3.9% IPA in very good nick. After this, and feeling strangely attracted to Mallinson's Brewery from Huddersfield, I tried a 4.3 pale ale named, oddly enough, Strange Attraction! Very nice it was too, and I decided to try a taste of Cornwall next with a copper-coloured best bitter from Padstow Brewery called Windjammer, 4.3% and not bad. Finally, although I don't usually go for speciality type ales I was feeling adventurous and decided to sample Sperrin Brewery's Orangipan, described as a fruity bitter - it certainly was that - at 4.8%. I enjoyed it, albeit not as much as some of the other beers I tried, and I'd recommend it.

Moving on to the pubs, Didler and myself first called at the **Tamworth Brewery Tap** on Market Street. This is quite a large pub now, and further extension may take place in the future. There's an upstairs room called Top of the Tap, and an outside area. As for the beer, I had what I

My beer of the day with Hopyard IPA, a 5.1% offering from Tamworth Brewery.

There were several other beers available. From there we went to the **Market Vaults**, A classic boozier in many ways which has four Joules beers on plus a couple of guests, one being Plan B's New Sense, a 4.5 pale ale, not a bad taste but I have had beers from there that I've enjoyed more.

Moving on, we went next to the **Sir Robert Peel** on Lower Gungate, a fair-sized and comfortable pub which has won several local CAMRA awards and some county ones, where I tried Beerhemian Hopsody - it's fairly obvious where the inspiration for the name comes from, brewed by Empire Brewery. This was a tasty 4% slightly copper-coloured ale, and another I'd recommend.

The **King's Ditch**, also on Lower Gungate, was our next port of call, and here I sampled Pacific Gem, a 4.2 golden ale from Firebrand, very nice indeed. Didler departed at this point to catch his train back to Derby, intent on dropping in at the Peacock Beer Festival, while I tried a Dockside dark from Gloucester Brewery, the first dark ale I'd had that day, and in excellent nick with a 5.2% ABV.

I made my way back to the Globe Inn then, and enjoyed a half of Holden's Black Country Mild, which is on regularly at the pub. It's long been a favourite mild of mine, and I haven't seen it elsewhere in Tamworth. I also enjoyed an excellent fish, chips and peas meal - everything at the Globe is good value in my opinion - and went up to my room to rest up for the evening session, or at least that's what I thought. However, even the best-laid plans can go awry, and I dropped to sleep in my room, having only intended to shower and change there, and woke up around 11pm, a bit late to go anywhere else, spending a comfortable night in bed to wake up refreshed the next morning, looking forward to the next adventure.

The bus eventually came, and after a 25 minute journey I arrived at my intended destination, having passed a few interesting-looking pubs in the villages we went through - maybe I'll investigate some of them if I come again next year, and headed for Tamworth Street and the first pub, the **Beerbohm**. This is a very comfortable pub, with plenty of seats and, more importantly, plenty of ale. The one I tried was from Scribblers, called Ale of two Cities, I didn't make a note of the ABV of this, an occasional failing of mine perhaps due to advancing age, but it was most enjoyable start to the day, very tasty and very moreish. Over the road from the Beerbohm is the **Pig**, Derbu Brewing Company's first venture into the area. As one would expect the pub is very tastefully-decorated, with several beers from the Derby Brewing Company rangs as well as guests. As an early customer, there was only one other person there apart from the friendly bar staff, who were disposed to chat. I wish Derby Brewing well with this venture, several people came in while I was there drinking Derby Quintessential, a 5.2 ale (I think!) and very tasty it was too. Food is available here, and one or two were ordering it. Next I went to the whippet Inn, a micropub whose name is based on a pub in the Carry On films, although the name of that one was, I believe, the Whippet Inn. There's a picture of a whippet on the sign, and some fine ales inside the pub. I spent a bit more time than I'd originally intended here, partly due to the excellent quality of the beers, partly due to the excellent company, and also because it rained

very hard every time I thought of moving on, honestly! It is quite a popular pub, with four ales plus cider and a selection of wines and spirits.

My first beer was from Bragdy Conwy Brewery name El Camino, 4% and very good indeed, so much so that I had to have another! A couple of guys dropped in, Phil and Roy, I didn't know them but they were happy to include me and the barman in their conversation, so I settled in, the frequent heavy showers not encouraging a move. I also tried Nene Valley Egyptian Cream, a 4.3% dark ale, again in excellent nick, before the weather cleared sufficiently for me to get to my next pub without the risk of getting drowned. All the pubs I'd been to up to then had been on Tamworth Street, as was the next and final one, the **WIP**, or **Work In Progress**. This had 3 Real aAes on, along with plenty of Craft Ales, which seemed to be very popular, most people there were drinking them. However, I stuck to the Real stuff, very much my preferred option, and started with Pancio, a 4% pale beer from Tiny Rebel, and one of the tastiest I had during my stay. I chatted at length to the friendly barman, who had a beer with me, then to the customers, trying a Thornbridge Cortado, a 4.9% hoppy pale ale.

Sadly, that was my last drink in Lichfield as time was moving on and I wanted to get back to Tamworth for another visit to the Beer Festival, having identified a couple of beers I wanted to try while reading the programme that morning. If I'd had time I'd have called at the **Angel**, a Joules pub that had been recommended to me, but it wasn't to be, maybe next time. Having caught the bus back to Tamworth, I dropped in as planned at the Beer Festival, this time sampling Stealth Double Crosser, a 4% unfiltered pale ale, Tamworth Brewery Nutty Professor, a 4.6% chocolate peanut butter porter, my second venture into speciality beer land in as many days, and Crown Brewhouse Motorcade, 4.3% and described as an experimental golden ale - in my opinion there's no need for further experiments

as this was, like the other beers I tried, in great nick and very tasty indeed. I'm a semi-regular visitor to the Tamworth Beer Festival, and it's always well worth a visit, the beer is always good and there's plenty of decent pubs to go to after visiting the festival. I asked the staff if the Masonic Rooms is to be the permanent venue, they weren't sure, but wherever it is, I'll be back! So, another enjoyable trip was over - well, not quite. I dropped in at the **Phoenix** on George Street, which I've been to before, for a swift half. I omitted to note the beer, another senior moment or perhaps due to slight over-indulgement in the delights of Lichfield, but it was very good, and there are seven or eight beers available here. Then it was back to the **Globe Inn** for a rest before my evening meal, excellent as ever but this time without the Black Country Mild - I thought water a more sensible option this time! After another good night's rest, and an excellent breakfast, I bid farewell to Tamworth, maybe until next year. **Exadman**
