Beer & Pub News

Peak Ales brewery have taken on their first pub, the Lamb at Holymoorside, near Chesterfield, which is a wonderful, tworoomed traditional village pub. The former hosts were Pat and Alan Goucher who ran it for 36 years since buying it from Home Ales. They had recently been looking to retire and fortunately, a local villager, who wanted this bub to survive as a traditional local, bought it. He contacted Rob and Debra Evans, owners of Peak Ales, who gareed to take it on. This is great news and I will shortly be off to check it out as it's always been a top favourite of mine in the past. I wish mine hosts every success in the future and will raise my glass to this great pub's survival. The Didler.

As one door closes, another one opens: the Pump It Up micro-pub in Belper closed its doors for the last time on Sunday 6th March. The reason given by the leaseholders, Matlock Wolds brewery is that the business was no longer proving to be viable due to low footfall. This is the second closure along this stretch of road after the Belper Tap closed last October. As for the door opening, a lot of progress has been made to the Last Post

in Derby but due to the extra cleaning needed, an opening time is now looking to be around Easter. Sooty.

A new micro-brewery in Chesterfield is about to release its first ales in the Chesterfield Arms on the 1st & 2nd April. Josh Clarke, who learned his craft at Bramptons and Thornbridge breweries, established his Resting Devil brewery in a room behind the Chesterfield Arms where his wife Emma is the licensee. Drinkers in Chesterfield will probably know that the Chesterfield Arms regularly features 10+ cask ales on the bar of which three will now be dedicated to Resting Devil beers. Josh hopes that any surplus can be kegged or bottled for local distribution.

The Cross Keys, Nottingham, along with Copper (City) and Copper (Mapperley), formerly owned by Great Northern Inns, have been taken over by the RedCat pub company. This is reported as being "an investment vehicle founded by former Greene King chief executive Rooney Anand" and it made its first acquisition in March 2021. It has since bought 42 pubs from Yates's and Slug & Lettuce operator Stonegate. It's not clear what this means for the Trent Navigation pub and brewery near Trent Bridge which still appears to be owned by GNI. The Didler.

Despite its closure by Magpie Brewery at the end of January, it seems that the Crafty Crow in Nottingham is likely to be taken over by the Pub People company, based in Alfreton. Operations Director Andrew Crawford informed "In The Sticks" that: "We are at an advanced stage in the negotiations with the landlord regarding a new lease at the Crafty Crow and would hope to be able to re-open

the pub in early May after a small refurbishment, if everything goes to plan. The bar will still focus on cask and craft beer

with a particular emphasis on an exciting range of local and regional micro-brewed products".

Mick Ward at the Angry Bee, Heanor has informed "In The Sticks" that the business is up for sale. He is expecting to complete the year-end books and get a valuation which might take the process through to the early summer. There are several interested parties and the premises will remain as a pub.

While in Heanor, your editor called in at the Crown Inn recently and found 5 ales on the bar: Timothy Taylor Knowle Spring, Bradfield Farmers Blushed, Whim Flower Power, Stancill Conversion and Robinsons Dizzy Blonde. Definitely worth a visit if you're in the area.


After a period of closure following the death of landlord Stewart Austin, the Puss In Boots, Windley, re-opened in early December. The pub has been in the same family for about 30 years and is now being run by Stewart's widow Josie and her twin sister Megan with support from other family members. For those who don't know, this is a traditional pub - wooden panelling, beams, open fire etc - with two rooms, one of which is dog-friendly. Cask ales on the bar are restricted to Bass and Pedigree only.

Amber Valley POTY, which was announced on 3rd March, is the Talbot, Ripley with the Dead Poets, Holbrook and Angels Micro-pub, Belper coming in 2nd and 3rd. Congratulations go out to all concerned.

Beer Festival News

Titanic brewery have installed a new manager at the Old Poets Corner, Ashover with the aim of reviving the fortunes of this characterful pub. Stephen Stacey contacted "In The Sticks" recently to announce the return of its beer festival to be held over the Easter week-end (14th-17th April). Beers are promised from Oakham, Blue Monkey, Castle Rock, Ossett, Thornbridge, Kelham Island and Ashover plus the usual Titanic range on the bar. Music is to be provided by What Katie Did Next, The Black Hands and Saguaro.



In The Papers

According to an article in the Derby Telegraph dated 23rd March, the White Swan in Ockbrook is to receive a £120k investment from owners Star Pubs & Bars. The current licensees, Joanne Kershaw and Michael Lewis, took over the pub in 2019 and they have reportedly increased the footfall significantly since then. The pub will be closed on 28th March but is expected to reopen before Easter.

The **Royal Oak**, Ockbrook is also included in the National Pubs category.

It is not possible to include all of them but they all appear on the "Out & About" page of the RuRAD web-site. See accounts of trips to Leicester (Chris P Duck), Boston (Chris P Duck) & Chesterfield (Big Al) along with pieces that have appeared in print.

Nottingham Visit, 14th December

Arriving by train we soon found ourselves at the Cross Keys, a traditional city street corner pub by the tram lines with overhanging trees which features mainly Navigation ales. I had their Rebel and American IPA, with 2 other Navigation ales plus London Pride also on alongside a cider and around a dozen keg lines. A good start and we then walked to the Kean's Head which is one of several Castle Rock pubs in the city. Situated on a narrow tree lined street by the churchyard, it surprisingly held only 2 Castle Rock ales -Sherwood Reserve and the inevitable Harvest Pale but had a very interesting range of quest ales. I had Bristol Beer Factory Fortitude with others being Siren Craft Brew Yu Lu, Five Points Pale, Shipstones IPA and 3 cider lines. Apparently it was once a lace factory which was not much of a surprise being located in the Lace Market area. Next, it was on to another attractively fronted pub,

the GBG Fox & Grapes which again was a Castle Rock re-creation of an older pub. With 4 Castle Rock ales available, I was tempted by the curiously named Brass Castle Snow Eater with Milestone Honey Porter and Almasty Believe IPA (from Newcastle) being the other guests. It's a lot easier to appreciate these classic pubs when quiet on midweek afternoons.

Our next call was in Sneinton at the GBG King William IV, known locally as the King Billy. This striking Victorian street corner independent pub has a central bar with several unspoilt drinking areas on quarry tiled floors. Here I had Lost Industries Nightswim in preference to 2 each of Oakham and Black Iris ales. Great ambience here with good beer and a very friendly welcome. Just along the street is the Partizan Tavern, a micro-pub which only opened this year, the name hailing from an association with the Belgrade football club whose logo appears all over the pub. I had a good chat with the landlord here as all 4 of us went for the same choice of Old Brown Mouse from Three Blind Mice - it was good enough for 3 of us to have the same again. Given more time the Lenton Lane Pale Moonlight, Atom Bragg's Law and Marble Stout would no doubt have been partaken.

Back in the Lace Market, we visited the Angel with its own micro-brewery. This is a listed building, possibly not properly appreciated in the dark and I believe had 3 Angel cask ales but it was quite crowded and difficult to get to the bar to view the poorly defined pump clips. Not sure about the ale quality as one of our group thought my probable IPA was a cider so enough said. There is a vast collection of vinyl LP records which were playing, causing some people older than us to dance at 5.00 pm so I dread to think what it is like later on. In addition to this, a travelling salesman unsurprisingly failed to interest any of us (but maybe the dancers?) into buying a fez. On to the Six Barrel Drafthouse, which we did not enjoy as much as previous pubs with the lack of atmosphere in a managed house. The beer selection was OK with Little Critters, Black Sheep, Navigation and Castle Rock, whilst I had a Woodforde's Wherry. The GBG Newshouse was also somewhat disappointing with Shipstones, Burton Bridge, Black Iris and

Castle Rock to select from. On to our penultimate pub, the GBG Vat & Fiddle which is another Castle Rock place near to the railway station. With 8 Castle Rock and 5 quest ales this was a superb selection of which I had Turning Point Radio Nowhere Pale Ale and one from Bang The Elephant which I failed to record the name of - other quests were from Pentrich, Beermats and North Riding. A knowledgeable barman enhanced our visit with his personality and advice. The last call was inevitably going to be the GBG Beerheadz as it's in a station building. Only 3 cask ales on but a lot of long names for a small selection - I had Great Newsome Prickly Batch Otchan & Frothingham Best with Ashover Blackberry Stout also on. Overall a very good day out with no pubs not worthy of a return and plenty more still to visit Chris P Duck

More Heritage Pubs, 14th Jan

The purpose of this trip was to visit three more CAMRA Heritage pubs in and near to Macclesfield. I was joined by Apollo on this occasion and we set off at about 11.00 from Belper on a dry but quite foggy day. Fortunately, the sun broke through and quite soon dispersed the mist. First call was at the Harrington Arms in Gawsworth which was one of many Robinsons pubs in the area. The three-storey building, parts of which date back to the 17th century, is attached to a working farm and until 2007, both were run by the same family. Comprising four main rooms, each with its own individual character (and number) and all with fireplaces. We settled into the impressive Tap Room with its red and black quarry tiled floor, scrubbed wooden tables and wall benches. The latest addition to the pub's accommodation was the former farm kitchen featuring a range with 8 ovens. To the rear is a large garden with its own bar looking out over fields (although you can still hear traffic on the busy A536). Beers on offer were exclusively from Robinsons (which is normally the case): Wizard, Dizzy Blonde, Unicorn and Trooper.

We then headed into Macclesfield, found free parking (yay!) and walked to the Castle, hidden away on narrow, cobbled Church Street. The frontage is white painted brick made to look like a Tudor half-timbered house. This is another multi-roomed pub with

a lot of wood panelling and bench seating. We were made very welcome by the charming barmaid and were surprised to learn that the pub had only re-opened 4 months ago (September 2021) after having been closed for 8 years! The owner had wanted to convert the building into flats but the Grade II listing specified that it had to be kept as a pub. It's difficult to imagine how much effort went into restoring this pub while retaining its original character. We settled into the small Snug while the barmaid, and later, the chef, attempted to keep the fire alight. Ales on offer were from Wincle and Storm Brewing (Macclesfield) plus Titanic Plum Porter. We also sampled the excellent sausage rolls which it was revealed to us later were actually vegan - we were assured however that the home made pork pie did contain bits of pig. The pub doesn't currently do meals but they expect to offer a range of snacks when the kitchen is up and running.

The last of the pubs on the itinerary was the Holly Bush at nearby Bollington. Although this appears in the Geoff Brandwood book of Heritage Pubs published in 2013, it no longer appears in the on-line listing. This may be due to some of the original 1930s features having been lost during a refurbishment in 2016. However, the work has been done by Robinsons to a very high standard and the pub still features wood panelling, parquet flooring and tasteful wall coverings -"Brewer's Tudor" style it's called apparently. We again settled into the Snug to enjoy Robinsons Unicorn and Old Tom, the latter at 8.5% only being permitted in half pint measures (although you could have two of them). The barman and locals at the bar were friendly and were happy to share information about the pub while we were there. Snug Dave.

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Hartlebury, Stourport & Bewdley

On the morning of January 15th I met up with Trigger, HH and the legend that is the Didler at Derby train station for the typically woefully inadequate 10.31 Cross Country train to Birmingham (I don't think I've ever sat down on a train to Birmingham, though Trigger and I did have the luxury of standing in 1st Class!). On arrival we took a rather circuitous route to Moor Street station where we connected with the 11.30 train to

Worcester, alighting at Hartlebury, and immediately calling in at the GBG Tap House, which is incorporated in the station buildings. It is the home of Hartlebury brewery, which is adjacent, and had 4 of their beers available plus a couple of guest beers. Naturally we all went for the Hartlebury beers with me going for Hartlebury Hooker and Bitter Strikes Back with both, though being quite similar, in fine form. From there we took a walk to the White Hart Inn, as it was in the vicinity, and found 3 ales on hand-pump with Enville Ale being in good order.

To say there is a paucity of public transport in this area is an understatement so HH (who was taximan) got us a taxi to Stourport-on-Severn where our first port of call was the BOA (Brothers Of Ale) brewery, which was absolutely fantastic with 7 of their ales on hand-pump and a couple being tried by everyone. I started with The 7 and I think we all finished on VVD oatmeal stout, a superb drop. Then it was a short walk, negotiating (just) the unfeasibly busy roads, to the GBG Black Star where there was a group of lads dressed up as golfers hogging the bar, much to HH's annoyance. There was a good selection of 8 ales on hand pump, with a fair few from Wye Valley of which I plumped for the Wholesome Stout, mmmmmmm. From here the day began to go south as the GBG Swan only had 1 of its 5 or 6 wickets in use and that was dispensing Wye Valley HPA so we didn't linger.

We must have then waited half an hour for a taxi that was on its way when Trigger called (though they didn't say where from), to take us to Bewdley and drop us at the GBG Brewery Tap, which in fairness, was well worth it when we got there. 5 Bewdley beers were on offer and 2 or 3 could have been tried but too much time had been lost so we had to make do with just the 1 -William Mucklow's Dark Mild which was outstanding.

Then it was on to the **Real Ale Tavern**, which had 9 beers on hand-pump but quality was definitely lacking. Trigger and I went for **Golden Duck** Nelly's 'Port' Stout, which wasn't very good and Didler wasn't impressed with his **Mallinsons** beer either. We moved on to the Mug House but didn't linger and finished off in the GBG **Great Western** to find 5 beers on the go but we were hastily moved

away from the bar and told it was table service only. This turned out to be rather shambolic, as if hastily introduced to combat some new unknown pandemic. After our brief glimpse at the beers the barmaid seemed to expect us to remember them so she reeled them off including Black Christmas, which turned out to be Goffs Black Knight and

Bewdley Numbers, which turned out to be Bewdley 2857. I guess the names of beers are more important to some than others. She did however sort us out a taxi, which she said she'd give us a shout for if she saw it pull up! She said we'd got about half an hour to wait so HH & Didler managed to get another drink in but by the time she'd come back for mine &

Triggers I thought it too late so decided to go and stand outside for the taxi in case she missed it. We got a slightly earlier train back to New Street but still had to wait for the 18.49 back to Derby, which we did get a seat on! Back in Derby, HH and I called in the **Brunswick** for a swift couple of halves before heading off into the night. **Rodders**.
