A new brewery, beerSocial, based in the Attercliffe area of Sheffield has started to release its first brews and can be sampled at the Brunswick, Derby - at least at the time of writing. Three beers are reported on Untappd: Out To Launch (4.5%), Just The Job (4.8%) and Mind The Gap (4.0%). The following information has been lifted from an article by Dave Pickersgill which appeared on the Sheffield CAMRA web-site:

Head Brewer, Richard Hough gained his brewing experience at Abbeydale, Acorn, Lenton Lane and Shiny and was also cofounder of the Blue Bee brewery. The brewing kit was formerly used by Little Ale Cart whose beers were sold at the Wellington, Shalesmore before their change to Neepsend. brewSocial is associated with the Yes2Ventures (Y2V) group who aim to provide work opportunities for people disadvantaged in the labour market. Y2V also manage theSocial which includes a bar where brewSocial ales may be found. More details can be found by putting "brewSocial Sheffield" into Google.

Charisma Bypass reports that he sampled and approved of two ales at Angels micro-pub, Belper from Lord's Brewing which are based in Golcar, outside Huddersfield. These were Malamute (4.5%) IPA and The Bandon Car (4.8%), an Irish Porter. The brewery was founded in 2015 and contrary to some rumours, has no connection with Magic Rock, also based in Huddersfield.

The **Five Lamps**, Derby will be closing for refurbishment by the new licensees (Brown Ales) on the 3rd September and is expected to re-open to the public on the 20th. A soft opening by invitation only on the 19th September is planned.

I've recently heard from the owners of the **Greyhound Inn**, Warslow (Lee and Jenni Wilson), about their new on-site brewery, opening shortly and which will be called **Wilsons of Warslow Brewing Co.** Photos on both the pub and brewery Facebook pages show the brewing space being prepared and brewing equipment ready for installation. It sounds like a visit out to this lovely area will shortly be on the cards. Good luck to all

A planning application has been submitted to Broxtowe Borough Council (22/00537/FUL) to convert a shop on Lawrence Avenue, Awsworth to a micro-pub.

The **Smithfield**, Derby has won POTY for Derbyshire South with the **Talbot**, Ripley as runner up. The **Smithfield** will now compete with the other regional winners for the East Midlands title.

It is reported that the **Thorn Tree**, Ripley and the **Steampacket**, Swanwick, no longer offer CAMRA discount.

Tom Soar, owner of **Tom Said**, Ripley sent an update regarding his recent brewing and beer festival activities...

Following the purchase of the Bartleby's Brewing kit, the first beer from the newly named Belper Brewing Co. has been produced, a 4.1% hazy pale hopped with Cascade and Simcoe and called One. This has been distributed to Tom Said (Ripley), Bang In Belper, Arkwrights (Belper), White Hart (Bargate), Flowerpot (Derby), Smithfield (Derby), Brown Cow (Mansfield), Partizan Tavern (Nottingham), Shakespeares Ale & Cider House (Sheffield) and Kelham Island Tavern (Sheffield). Further brews, to be called Two, Three and Four are either planned or in production. Apparently, these are test brews and are unlikely to be repeated.

Beer Festival News

There is no shortage of beer festivals to entertain the ale drinker in September so here are extra details about a couple of them in the local area...

Tamworth Beer Festival (8th-10th, September) will feature 75+ real ales from micro-breweries, including festival specials and many new ales plus a range of ciders and perries. On Friday & Saturday evenings there will be a Gin and Belgian Bottles Bar from 7.00 pm. Open 11.00-11.00 each day. Admission £3.00 except Friday 5.00-11.00 (£4.00). Admission to CAMRA members is £1.00 throughout.

Readers should also know that Lichfield, Sutton & Tamworth (LST) CAMRA have produced an excellent Tamworth Town Ale Trail leaflet which can be downloaded from their similarly excellent web-site - very clear and easy to navigate and, as far as I can tell, all the links work, which is more than can be said for some other CAMRA web-sites I have visited. The Great Central Railway beer festival returns for its 14th year from the 8th-11th September. There are bars at Loughborough Central, Quorn & Woodhouse, Rothley and Leicester North stations but check the Great Central Railway web-site for details about the opening hours. 70+ beers are promised from breweries near and far including Blue Bee, Dow Bridge, Goffs, Moonface and Tindall. Also expect 20+ ciders/perries. Cost of entry is £4.00 or it's free with a ticket to travel on one of the trains, which are running on every day of the festival.

Bell & Harp, 29th July

On recent visits to the **Bell & Harp**, Little Eaton on a Friday afternoon, ales spotted on the bar have included Bass, Little Rambler, Stancills Stainless, Dancing Duck Release

The Quacken & Aye Up, Silver Brewhouse Eyup Cocka!, TT Landlord, Whim Hartington IPA, Blue Monkey PG Sips and Thornbridge Green Mountain. Plus at least 2 draught ciders from Lilleys. This is a fine looking pub and they also host the currently fashionable popup food outlets from the car park. Recent travelling kitchens have included El Capo's, Dine Like A Don and Let's Taco 'Bout It. Snug Dave.

Out & About

Regular contributor to "In The Sticks", Chris P Duck, makes frequent trips to west Wales and submits articles about each visit. Here is one from earlier this year...

Ceredigion, April 2022

A long weekend visit to see my brother in mid to west Wales based in Llangeitho enabled a few pub visits but in this area pubs with decent ales are few and far between. At Llangeitho we twice visited the GBG Three Horseshoe, having a good quality meal there one evening. The landlord originates from Heage and is a long suffering Rams supporter - he offered 2 ales from Evan Evans of which I preferred the darker Warrior to the Ocean Gold. On one trip out to Lampeter where I had not been before and is one of the larger towns, we found a dearth of decent pubs so visited the Black Lion which is more of a hotel and eatery. This featured just the one cask ale, Glamorgan Jemima's Pitchfork although that was reasonable. The GBG Nag's Head is nearby and may have been worth a visit but I did not have enough time. It seems unlikely that I would visit Lampeter again for beer.

We also visited Aberystwyth and tried a couple of GBG pubs that I had been in previously. The Glengower Hotel is a proper residential hotel but has a decent bar area and good ale selection with on my visit with Mantle Rock Steady and Moho, Wye Valley Butty Bach, Purple Moose Glaslyn Ale and TT Landlord. It is great to sit outside with bay views when the weather is decent, albeit not on this occasion. The Wetherspoons Yr Hen Orsaf is opposite the bus stop so I had time for a quick one before departing. This is one of their more disappointing outlets and quite shabby inside. I tried Peerless Knee-Buckler

IPA but sent it back as it did not clear, to be replaced by Ringwood Old Thumper which was the only option other than the usual Spoons beers. The latter was not much better and the barman did not turn round the Peerless clip although I asked him to do it. Ironically there was a sign on the bar claiming "Good Beer Guide 2022 - We Are In It" - for the life of me I cannot imagine how. Our only other pub visit was to the Black Lion at LLanrhystud where we had an excellent meal accompanied by a decent pint of Brains Rev James, which was the only cask ale. I will be back in the area again on a regular basis and hope to find a few more decent pubs but it appears to be a tall order especially as there are some that I have never yet seen open. Your editor also has family connections in Wales, having been born in Pembrokeshire and, prior to the Covid pandemic, I would make regular visits to the area (also many times as a child but drinking beer wasn't on the agenda in those days). I generally planned my journey from Derby along a route which included Ross-on-Wye, Brecon and Carmarthen and I would call in at a couple of GBG pubs along the way for lunch and a beer. Based on my own experiences and reading through CPD's articles, it's difficult not to come to the conclusion that finding pubs with interesting ales in south-central and west Wales can be hard going. That's not to say that there aren't fine pubs in this area but the beer selection can often be disappointing and even the GBG pubs regularly offer no more than 2 (or maybe 3) different ales. This is a shame when as of January 2021 the Brewery Bible (www.thebrewerybible.com) lists 78 breweries in the principality including well-known brands like Bluestone, Evan Evans, Purple Moose and Tiny Rebel. Thirteen aspiring lovable moptops from the Last Drinking Skool (motto: Veni Bibi Cecidi) descended upon the Knowledge Quarter of Liverpool on a lucky sunny Thursday in early July not affected by train strikes and also currently devoid of court hearings for any up before the beak. A 10 minute stroll from Lime Street station led us to meet at the GBG Dispensary where most opted for a good

pint of Ossett White Rat while others chose Oakham Citra, Titanic Plum Porter, Weetwood Eastgate or Weetwood Southern Cross. The bar was not yet busy and we managed to all sit around the long table and stayed for another pint.

Seven of our number were at Swansea Uni in the 1970s so a photo was taken outside before we moved on to the Fly In The Loaf, a converted bakery owned by Okell's, based in the Isle of Man. This pub features a long large bar and plenty of seating, where Okell's Bitter was enjoyed, along with more Ossett White Rat and Silver King, Rat Brewery Rat In Black, Rooster's Yankee and Thornbridge Jaipur keg, all while sitting underneath a TV showing a man with unruly blond hair going through the motions of a resignation. Happenstance, our plan went haywire too. As a large group, we had two bankers, each holding a kitty - and while one banker went one way, and t'other, t'other, the group split. Follow the money. Nothing personal, strictly business. A little time was spent in the Philharmonic Dining Rooms despite forewarning of high prices, but we hadn't reckoned on it being packed on an early weekday afternoon with new graduates in mortar boards and their proud families. Without stopping for a beer, some went to admire the plumbing, and each faction moved on to other pubs.

The Caledonian is a vegan corner pub with beer and food and a stage, but just beer was taken at this time - Melwood Knowslev Blonde, Flagship Parade, Happy Hippie Friend of the Devil, and Westons Old Rosie cider were scored. We had passed the Roscoe Head as a large group, but now we were whittled down to a size the pub (one of GBG Magnificent Five) could accommodate. 4T's Chocolate & Fudge "Stout Detectives", Mallinsons Wai-iti Golden Ale and Timothy Taylor Landlord were selected from the six cask pumps. Not far away is the Grapes (where mortar boards were again fashionable), and space was found in this corner local to enjoy Wander Beyond Black Arches and Cwrw Iâl Community Kia Kaha! (Be Strong!) were chosen from nine pumps and this pub scored highest at the end of the day.

Meanwhile our splinter group had hastened

their step, perhaps having realised they had a greater share of the kitty than they should have, and entered Ye Cracke, From their two pumps we ordered Bass Premium Ale and Phoenix Dragon IPA to drink in one of many snugs after the very chatty landlady had delighted/interrogated us long enough. My 1968 Beatles biography mentions this pub as a hangout of John Lennon when an art student. Despite phone calls, messaging and pigeon post, the groups didn't reform. A ten minute stroll along Duke Street led some to the Bridewell, Grade II listed local 2022 POTY where the former police cells are now seating areas although we stayed outside in the shaded garden to drink Brewsmith West Coast Pale and Conwy Welsh Pride.

It was getting into the early evening so the various tribes headed to Lime Street, but those with time to spare stopped at Dr Duncan's to have a bite to eat and drink Cains Best Bitter, Neptune Shifting Sands and Brains The Rev James in this large pub with conference rooms where later, had we not already exhausted our polemic, we could have joined Merseyside Skeptics social night. A gallant last stand was made at the Crown to taste Adnams Eastern Edge, Oakham Citra and Fullers London Pride before trains home to Bolton, London, Birmingham and Chesterfield. Our unlucky Derby constituent however got stuck at Grindleford behind a broken goods train so hitched to Bakewell where his dutiful spouse collected him and got him home just before midnight. At least he didn't have to spend the night in the 3.5 mile Totley Tunnel but he will have to buy a new rolling pin.

A good day, good beer and good pubs, and plenty more Liverpool and Merseyside real ale to explore another time. The beer of the day was that first Ossett White Rat. Our ages mean we know the Mersey Sound from first time around, although memories for Beatle songs are fading. Does anyone remember Getting Bitter, Get Bock, Let It Beer and Can't Buy Me Lager? Ginger Baker.



Yorkshire South & West, 8th July

On a very hot day we caught the train to Barnsley, changing at Sheffield *en route*. We were quite early and we needed to use the JDW **Joseph Bramah** until other target pubs

opened. It was a typical 'Spoons outlet with a local ale offering of Saltaire Titus & Cascade and Ossett White Rat - I had the Titus which was decent. Almost next door is the black and white timbered GBG Old No.7 which we found to be a pleasant old town pub with friendly staff. Of the 4 Acorn ales on offer I chose the traditional Barnsley Bitter which was excellent as was the Rudgate Golden Ale, with others from Abbeydale and Chin Chin plus Old Peculier. There was also a Cotswold cider on draught. I passed my time conversing with an agreeable local at the bar who always drank Old Moor Porter from Acorn. An excellent pub but as with many others, perhaps less appealing when busy on week-end evenings. Moving down a pedestrianised street opposite we soon found the GBG Jolly Tap, home of the Jolly Boys Brewery. Here I had their Jolly Collier Porter & YPA, served by a great friendly barmaid who took a photo of our "celebrity" team. Superb beer and a most enjoyable visit with Yorkshire Bitter & Supa-Citra PA completing the range.

It was then a short walk back to the station and on to Castleford. Here we found the GBG Doghouse amongst a plethora of mainly tacky shops in a modern street. Fortunately the pub itself was great with a couple of very keen lads on the bar where I tried Redemption Trinity (only 3.0%) and Harrogate Best, both being very good. There were 2 other ales from Wilde Child, another from Harrogate and an 8.5% ale called Razz Matazz (I could not read the brewery name from my picture*), plus plenty of craft keg ales. The walls were decorated with all sorts of cartoons with inscriptions of song lyrics all over the ceiling in this rustic setting. Moving on next to the GBG Junction which is famous for serving most of the ales from their own wooden casks backfilled from local breweries. It is a tiled corner pub with the old "Beverley Fine Ales" original raised lettering still displayed. Inside it is very dated with separate rooms and high ceilings - a typical locals pub of a bygone era. Whether the ales we had were from the wood or not I did not ascertain but they were again very good - the bar held 2 ales from Half Moon and 2 from

Back to the train again for the short journey to Darton, where we began at the GBG Anvil Arms, one of the two village micro-pubs. With

4 local ales to select from I chose Mill Valley Mill Blonde ahead of Yorkshire Bitter & Cardinal Sin from Nailmaker and Clash Porter from Revolutions. Also on the main road is the G B G Darton Tap but with a far less interesting ale selection of Boltmaker, White Rat and Wainwright. The former was still very good and I expect the selection would be better on another occasion.

Our next train stop was at Chapeltown where it was a pleasure to visit the very popular GBG Commercial. With 8 ales available it was difficult to choose - I recall drinking TT Ram Tam which I had not had for ages but forgot to record the other (recurring theme here). Other ales were from Durham (x2), White Rose, Abbeydale, Neepsend plus Landlord and White Rat. Another cracking old fashioned

pub with numerous small rooms and outside tables on the car park. After this we still had time to visit the **Sheffield Tap** but did not record the extensive ale list here before departing for home. **Chris P Duck**.
