#### Beer & Pub News

It has been reported that the **Puss In Boots**, just set back off the Wirksworth Road near Windley, has closed, probably permanently. The pub closed for a period following the death of long-standing landlord Stewart Austin in 2020 but re-opened in December 2021 and was being run by Stewart's widow Josie and her twin sister Megan with support from other family members.

Another report about the new Rabona Sports Bar in Matlock, this time from Riberman...

Just an update on the new Rabona Sports Bar and Tex-Mex restaurant on Dale Road, Matlock which was previously the Pointing Dogs. The bar opened last week (15th March) and I popped in yesterday evening (24th March) around 7.00 pm. There were about 40 punters in at a time when the Pointing Dogs was usually closed. A lively atmosphere, music and an arcade style basketball game in the ground floor bar, with food, mainly burgers, pizzas etc. available on the ground floor and in a large upstairs dining area which has views over the River Derwent. There was the usual range of keg beers and lagers but surprisingly

for a bar of this type, there is a solitary hand pump! When I enquired about real ale, I was told that the plan is to have one regularly changing cask line, on this occasion it was Timothy Taylor's Landlord at £4.40 a pint and in good condition. The pub is also dog friendly, but at night maybe a little noisy for our four legged friends? Riberman.

I thought "In The Sticks" would like to know that the long closed Blenheim House hotel in Etwall has very recently opened as a pub under brand new ownership. It was previously a small hotel with bar and restaurant and was most recently owned by Marston's. It didn't sell cask ale in its last years and the overall beer sales were very poor with quality to match apparently. It got beer lines installed just before the Easter holidays. Currently it is selling Dancing Duck Ay Up and 22 both in very good condition. The plan is to have possibly a Dancing Duck beer, maybe Bass and a regularly changing guest beer to "maintain interest" with regular drinkers. These plans are somewhat "fluid" at the moment and they are open to suggestions from customers apparently. They are currently sourcing lager and similar from Molson Coors and were thinking of having a Sharp's cask beer. However, I was told that their test samples of Sharp's haven't been widely welcomed by customers and they are rapidly rethinking this! If they can get planning permission the revitalised pub exterior will be stripped back to the bare brick once more. The existing Blenheim House pub name is very likely to change. A number of locals would like the name returned to its original Etwall Arms name and this is under consideration. Food will be offered when a chef can be recruited and the time scale until food is regularly on the menu

is expected to be something like 6 to 8 weeks according to the new owner. At present I have no information on whether the pub will eventually offer accommodation once more. I would expect it will though. Andrew CoolUnc.

The former BeerHeadZ micro-pub just outside Nottingham train station, re-opened as the Brew Tavern on 14th March. After a little refurbishment, the bar now offers 5 cask ales and 8 craft keg beers.

John Smith at the Victoria Inn, Derby has installed four more hand-pumps on the (small) bar, bringing the total up to 10. He is hoping to have 8 or 9 in use at any one time. Apart from the regular beers from Leatherbritches, there is always an ale from Little (glutenfree) and there was also a beer from Pentrich on a recent visit. A beer festival in conjunction with the Brunswick Inn and supported by Derby CAMRA is planned for July. Snug Dave.

"In The Sticks" is sad to report that two more small breweries have fallen by the wayside: Chapter Brewing (Runcorn) and Silver Brewhouse (Staveley)...

Chapter Brewing, based just outside Runcorn, Cheshire, announced that it would be closing at the end of June. This despite Dead Man's Fist, a smoked porter, winning Best in Class at the recent CAMRA Winter Beer Festival. The Chapter Brewing Tap, three-times winner of the Halton CAMRA POTY competition, will remain open on Fridays and Saturdays until the end of June. This is an extract from a Facebook post dated 2nd April...

"After 8 years of fun, freneticism and fulfillment, it is time to close the book on Chapter Brewing. We have had the privilege of making beer for you all and being alongside

you drinking it: whether that is at the Tap, at a festival, online during lockdown or, most likely, at one of the many fabulous bars that we have delivered to and frequent ourselves. However, the time is right to finish this particular story."

Chapter Brewing beers will be available to sample at Chester Craft Beer Festival (18th May), Fyne Fest (31st May-2nd June) and Liverpool Craft Beer Expo (6th-8th June).

And this from the Silver Brewhouse Facebook page...

"It is with a very heavy heart that we have to announce that Silver Brewhouse has come to the end of the road. The pressures in the industry have taken their toll and it's time for us to leave. We would like to thank all our family and friends for the love and support over the years and all the wonderful people who've been a part of our team along the way. Many thanks also to our great customers for the support in keeping us going this long."

But on a brighter note, I came across a new brewery (to me) when I sampled a couple of excellent pints of Treehouse Brewery Hollywood at the Jolly Sailor in Hemington on a recent visit. Treehouse Brewery is based in Cavendish Bridge (Leicestershire, just) and was established as a company in July 2021 with their first commercial brews being released in March 2022. Apart from the Jolly Sailor, their beers have also been seen in the Hole In The Wall (Mickleover), Smithfield (Derby), Sawley Junction (Long Eaton), Hoptimist (Spondon) and Navigation (Shardlow). Look out for ales with punning tree-inspired names: Oakey Dokey, Take A Bough, Spruce Springsteen, We Tree Kings and so on. Snug Dave.

The Riflemans Arms in Belper re-opened on 13th April under new management after a short period of closure. There are 4 real ales on the bar which will typically include Dancing Duck Ay Up and Marston's Pedigree plus 2 guests, one of which is likely to be a 2nd offering from Dancing Duck. Also a range of up-market snacks - fromage végétarien anyone? The pub now opens at 12.00 noon every day.

The Pattenmakers Arms in Duffield, which was refurbished and re-opened as a "fine dining" destination in March 2023 after

about 3 years being closed, is now up for sale again with an asking price of £995k. The sale is being handled by Christie & Co. but the details can also be found on RightMove.

#### Beer Festivals

Just a reminder that the week-end tap takeovers at the **Crown Inn**, Beeston started again at Easter and will run through to the end of the summer.

Still more than a month away but this year's Belper Goes Green festival will take place at Belper Meadows Cricket Club on 7th-10th June. More details in the June issue.

#### In The Papers

The Nottingham Post (5th April) reported that a new micro-pub called Somewhere Beerhouse had opened in Beeston in the former Little Plant Guys shop which has now relocated to Canning Circus. It is located at the top end of High Street in Beeston, about a 10 minute walk from the Bus & Tram Interchange. On offer are craft keg beers, ciders and natural wines supplied by Nottingham based Kraft Werk while the people behind local Beeston deli, Essen provide the snacks. There are 4 beers, listed on the menu as Beer One, Beer Two etc. (although one is named in the article as being Parade (6.0%) from Beak Brewery based in East Sussex), and 4 wines - Wine 1, Wine 2 etc. Quirky or what? Like many micro-pubs, it's table service only. The bar is open Thursday to Sunday from 3.00 pm.

The following story appeared in various media outlets recently, including the Daily Telegraph...

The **Hole In The Wall** pub in Bodmin, which was awarded POTY 2024 by the local CAMRA branch (CAMRA Kernow) has had the award revoked following a complaint from a Truro resident. The pub is festooned with a large collection of memorabilia amassed over many years, some of which is connected with


Bodmin's role as a garrison town at the time of WWII. And included in this collection is a swastika armband brought back, no doubt, as a memento by a soldier returning from the war. Apparently this was seen as offensive (what isn't these days?) and Colin Curless contacted the local CAMRA branch to complain. According to the reports, it was a decision made at national and not local level. It is very likely that this item has been in the pub for nearly 80 years and it didn't stop the Hole In The Wall being awarded POTY on two previous occasions. Who remembers the TV series "Branded" from the 1960s? I wonder if CAMRA performed a "de-awarding" ceremony equivalent to Chuck Connors having his epaulettes torn off and his sword broken?

Also in the Daily Telegraph, was an article about the price of beer and where in the UK a cheap pint can still be found (apart from Wetherspoons, that is)...

The author of the article, Will Hawkes, was shocked to discover that he was being charged nearly £8 for a pint of "mass-produced beer" (in London, obv). He goes on to say...

"Of all the indignities of modern life, expensive beer is among the most infuriating. Beer should be an affordable pleasure - and yet, according to the CAMRA, a glass of beer in the pub is now a 'luxury'".

Without going into details, the three areas highlighted for good value ale are the Black Country, Sheffield and the north-east of England, specifically the coast between Stockton and Sunderland where a pint - even of Sarah Hughes Ruby Mild (6.0%) - could be purchased for "well under £4".



#### Out & About

Reports from Mansfield and Cambridge in this month's issue, but first, a response to CPD's dismissal of the Macclesfield Wetherspoons from reader, David Sheldon...

Reading Mr Duck's Macclesfield (a town we are very familiar with) report I noted a comment which I see a lot - someone claiming that a particular Wetherspoons pub is "the worst in the country" which usually makes me wonder how many Wetherspoons pubs these people have actually visited. The **Society Rooms** in Macclesfield is quite a nicely

arranged pub and usually offers an interesting range of cask ales, generally in good condition. As to how it rates against all the other JDW pubs is obviously about personal preference but as my wife and I have visited 911 Wetherspoons pubs, 302 of them on more than one occasion, I can say that there are JDW pubs that we prefer but also a good number which aren't as "good". #### Mansfield, 9th Mar, 2024

For this trip I caught the Nines bus from Derby and alighted in Ripley to visit the adjacent GBG Red Lion for breakfast and a beer festival pint. Both the breakfast and Theakston Atlantic Red were good and I departed just as another of the plentiful Nines buses was arriving and was hauled on board by a fellow AV CAMRA traveller. It takes a long time but eventually we arrived at the bus station at Mansfield. I am largely unfamiliar with this area and by a fairly vague route we found our way to the GBG Brown Cow where our small group then totalled six. The impressive cask list comprised ten ales with two from Everards and one each from Welbeck Abbey, Tollgate, Hawkshead, Ossett, Campbell Street, Woodfordes, Brewsters and Church End. My Tollgate Old Rasputin and Brewsters Brigid's Brew were both very good. Whilst here we were joined by a couple of officials from the rejuvenated Mansfield & Ashfield CAMRA who were good company and showed us their impressive magazine.

We moved into the main town area to the Garrison which is located in a row of shops. I was somewhat late arriving due to following the wrong group of people in the distant bright sunshine before recalculating. There were six cask ales: Theakston Best Bitter, Black Iris High Seas (7.0%) and four from Shiny - Big Scoop, Circle Pit, Dots and my choice Simple Souls. Decent ale in a standard town centre boozer with friendly service.

We then walked to the **Priors Well Brewery Taproom** which I had already passed twice on incorrect routes. This is in the impressive looking old Mansfield Brewery building with a large floor area and a long bar at one end. On the bar were Priors Well Pale, Citra and Resurrected - I went for the latter which was unfortunately not very good so also had the rarely seen Timothy Taylor Dark Mild which was better, with Castle Rock Crafty Flanker also on. Our next walk to the Stella Taps micro-pub took us past the Mansfield Town football ground but fortunately, we arrived just before it was invaded by football supporters. My ale of choice was Parkway Grand Slam and very good too. In this friendly place the other ales were White Lion and Dangerous Dave, both from Empire.

Back to the bus station for a return bus, alighting this time for a visit in Sutton-in-Ashfield to the GBG FireRock. This is the tap house for the brewery of the same name so I duly tried their Slow Rollin', with Verdant Bissoe and Black Iris Rise & Shine also available on cask. It is a rustic style open plan place with barrels for seats in some parts and the brewery visible in an adjacent room. I also had time to try a FireRock IPA (5.0%) which was a decent keg drink. #### Cambridge, 19th Mar, 2024

A coach trip took me, Pothole Ady and new Bosman free signings the Krankies to Cambridge, my first visit for over ten years. Arriving at 10.30 am we set off to the Regal because it was open early. It's a JDW establishment in a former cinema and one of the largest pubs in Britain. There was a residue of guest ales left over from their recent beer festival and my Anderson's Irish Red was decent enough for a starting drink. A ten minute walk saw us arrive at the GBG Elm Tree, a green painted street corner local amongst tree lined streets of 19th century houses. Inside there is a plethora of old brewery memorabilia in this superb traditional pub with plenty of cask ales to choose from. I had Lister's Limehouse Porter which was good with six other ales, mainly regional, on the bar. We avoided the Brewpoint reincarnation of Charles Wells due to recent disappointments with that brewery. We then continued on to the GBG Free Press. Another old corner pub with rustic furniture and not bad ale choice for a GK pub with surprising quest ales including Tiny Rebel Cwtch and Leeds Pale.

We next proceeded to the Cambridge Brew House, which I believe was the Kings Arms last time I was there. It has a long bar in a large single room with the brewery visible behind glass panels. There were five of their ales available on cask plus a guest from Barsham Oaks, and my CBH Parker's Pint was pretty good.

Our tour next took in the nearby GBG Maypole which was unfortunately temporarily enveloped by an encroaching building site with the background sound of pneumatic drills. Aside from the noise it was OK inside with a friendly bar manager and six cask ales on the eight hand-pulls that we saw. It was an eclectic selection with ales from Huntingford (x2), Shortts, Nene Valley, Tydd Steam and my choice Grain Best Bitter.

It was then a short walk by the riverside and over a bridge to reach the Pickerel. This pub dates from the 17th century and has low beams amongst other historical features. Now owned by GK the cask ale range was not the greatest with several GK and national ales but my Nethergate Umbel Magna was a really good drink. We then ordered an Uber taxi to the GBG Cambridge Blue. We found this to be a superb pub with an informative traditional landlord and we chatted with some local drinkers. A mere 9 ales occupied the fourteen hand-pulls and it was difficult to decide which ale to have. Because it was all so good we decided to stay for a second drink with my choices of Colchester Sweeney Todd and Mighty Oak Joy Six both being excellent. Other ales were from Crouch Vale, Tring (x2), Ossett and Nene Valley (x3),

Our final call was nearby at the Kingston Arms, not currently GBG but will be next time. The enthusiastic landlord had seven cask ales on of which I had Green Jack Trawlerboys, New River London Tap and Tring Side Pocket, all of which were equally good. The other four cask ales came from Welbeck Abbey, Hanlons and Ossett plus Bass. The last two pubs were so good that because of having additional drinks there we had to miss out on several other pubs on my list plus two later opening GBG pubs. That was no bad thing and leaves the option of a return visit to a city that I found far more impressive for good ales than my last visit many years previous. Chris P Duck.
